Testing is now well embedded. Invertebrate and Water Quality Testing ongoing. Mink Surveying will start – two people to be trained.</p> <p><b>15.2 Pan Parish Forum – Cllr Heslop sent update in advance and apologies for absence.</b> The next quarterly meeting of the Pillhill Pan Parish Forum (PPPF) will be on 14 October in Upper Clatford Village Hall. Rising main sewer failure in November 2023. In my update to the PC at the last meeting, I shared the response received to my Environmental Information Request (EIR) asking for SW's latest estimate of the total volume of sewage discharged into the Pillhill Brook as a result of this incident. You will remember that their response was that they did not hold that information and therefore could not provide it. They also informed me that if I was not content with their response I could request an Internal Review (IR) by their legal team. I requested the IR and received a response upholding their previous position. They also informed me (they have to do this by law) that if I was still not content I could refer the matter to the Office of the Information Commissioner. Bearing in mind that I have only ever requested their estimate of the total volume discharged, their position seems to imply that they have no estimate whatsoever. I am led to wonder what has been reported to the Environment Agency regarding this incident. I have therefore referred the matter to the Information Commissioner's office and await their response.</p>

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	Resident in attendance has had property impacted by above issue and thanks Parish Council for their involvement.

The draft is due on 20 Feb.</li> <li>• A revised project plan has been developed which will shape developments until Jun 25. RB explained the workstreams.</li> <li>• CCE is to develop a financial tracker which will identify project costs and normal Parish operating costs for the Chalk Pit.</li> <li>• RB introduced a proposal from the WG to engage a fundraising company to assist with fundraising. **Appendix A Borough Councillor Hasselmann and Floods Reports September 2024**

**Housing Targets in Test Valley**

The Government has recently proposed reforms to the National Planning and Policy Framework which includes changes to the standard method for calculating local housing need. The new calculation would mean a 75% increase in the housing figure from 524 to 921 homes per year for the Test Valley. The Council is working hard to respond to the consultation and making representation to Government relating to the challenges this revised housing figure would represent, as well as asking for clarification in relation to the current Local Plan process.

## **Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II Unveiling**

The Mayor of Test Valley, Councillor Ian Jeffrey, will be unveiling a new artwork of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Town Mills Riverside Park, Andover, at 3.45pm on Friday 27 September 2024.

The Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire, Mr Nigel Atkinson Esq, will also be in attendance for this special occasion.

Amy Goodman, resident artist at Project Workshops in Quarley (Anna Ward), was commissioned by Test Valley Borough Council to create two statues of the late Queen, one for Romsey and one for Andover. For the Andover statue, Amy drew inspiration from locals to depict the Queen's military links as Commander-in-Chief of the armed forces, reflecting Andover's close links with the Army. She ran several workshops for the community to include their memories of the late queen and her visit to the town in 1993.

## **New Local Nature Reserves**

Ladies Walk (Andover) and Abbotswood Nature Reserve (Romsey) have recently been designated as Local Nature Reserves. This is a national recognition of the value of these special sites for both wildlife and people. Ladies Walk is located on the south eastern edge of Andover and to the north east of Anna ward - between the entrance at Old Winton Road and Micheldever Road.

Established in 1785 and steeped in history, this path was originally part of the ancient Mark Way, with its trees planted in 1863 to commemorate the wedding of the future King Edward VII. The site features sloping grasslands and ancient fields, now managed to enhance its nature conservation value under the guidance of Natural England. With restored chalk grasslands and sweeping views across Andover, Ladies Walk offers a blend of natural beauty and historical significance.

## **Pick up after your Pooch**

For international dog day in August Test Valley Borough Council conducted a survey at Bury Hill after several complaints about dog waste. The flags in the pictures show the number of faeces at the Bury Hill site. We would remind users of the site to use the dog bins provided.

Apart from being smelly and unattractive, and something that no one wants to have to clean off their shoes, it can also have implications for the environment and for our health. Dog poo can carry lots of different bacteria E. Coli, Salmonella, and parvovirus as well as roundworm eggs, which can cause blindness in children. Whilst

rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocarasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures.

## **Appendix B Borough Councillor Drew Report September 2024**

### **Tap into solar power to save on bills and tackle climate change**

An opportunity for Hampshire residents to benefit from competitively priced, high-quality solar panel installation and save on future energy bills is once again available through the 2024 Solar Together scheme

The solar energy group-buying scheme, offered by independent experts iChoosr and promoted by Hampshire County Council, enables residents to invest in solar panels for their homes, fitted by pre-vetted installers, to reduce reliance on the national grid and lower their energy bills, as well as boost local renewable energy generation.

Through Solar Together, over 28,400 solar panels have already been installed in Hampshire – it is estimated that these installations alone will reduce carbon emissions by 59,205 tonnes over 25 years – equivalent to taking over 32,600 cars off the road during the same period.

Those interested need to register online at [www.hants.gov.uk/solartogether](http://www.hants.gov.uk/solartogether) by 18 October for a free and without obligation quote.

Participants who register will receive a complimentary quote that demonstrates their potential savings on energy bills through solar panel installation. They can also learn about the opportunity to earn extra income by selling excess energy to the National Grid. Additionally, participants have the flexibility to choose to include battery storage or electric vehicle charge points at the time of registration or when they accept their offer.

To participate in the Solar Together scheme, residents need to own the property or have permission from the property owner to install a solar system on the roof. Small- and medium-sized businesses and Commonhold Associations that meet these requirements can also participate.

### **Make attendance top of the ‘back to school’ checklist for 2024/25**

Hampshire County Council is renewing its call for parents and carers to prioritise regular school attendance in the new academic year.

### **Update from Hampshire County Council – September 2024**

Rates of school attendance have continued to improve in Hampshire but as with other local authority areas across the country, they remain below the levels typically seen before the Covid-19 pandemic. Latest figures show that 93.4 per cent of all possible sessions, recorded at daily registers in both the morning and afternoon, were attended by Hampshire pupils in the 2023/24 school year. This is compared to 95.5 per cent in 2018/19, the last full school year before the Covid-19 pandemic. Promisingly however, Hampshire has maintained its historic trend above the national school attendance rate, which was 92.8 per cent in 2023/24.

Educational specialists advise that attending school every day, unless unwell, is best for children to ensure that the solid foundations for their future education and employment can be laid. It is also one of the best ways of supporting a child’s mental and physical health.

### **£1.5m boost for people led climate change action**

Lower energy bills could be enjoyed by more people in the future as more communities are given the ability to lead the charge on climate change through greener, more efficient energy initiatives that will reduce carbon emissions and, in turn, lower costs

Thanks to £1.5 million National Lottery funding, Community Energy South, supported by Hampshire County Council, is set to expand its staff and volunteer numbers so that it can train and mentor a larger number of community groups, including providing expertise in human resources (HR) and marketing, so that community projects can get up and running more quickly.

The funding will boost employment and skills related training opportunities. Nicola Davidson, from Community Energy South said: “Most of the groups we work with have done amazing things with a small core team of volunteers. But it’s hard to grow projects and impact from volunteer time only. This funding will create 33 jobs across 11 community energy groups, bring on 100 volunteers and provide up to 50,000 people with energy saving advice. We will also see the creation of more renewable generation projects that are community owned, with the increased energy generated helping to reduce the overall demand for electricity from the carbon intensive national grid.”
